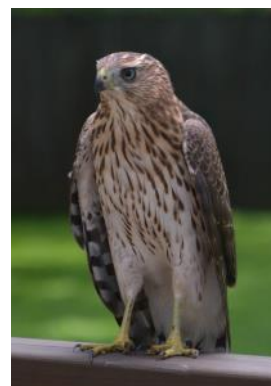

What to do with your cut brush? Think about building a habitat pile.

According to Virginia's Department of Forestry, brush/habitat piles provide wildlife with cover for escaping predators, resting, feeding, sheltering from bad weather and sometimes for raising young. Animals that use brush piles regularly include mammals (e.g. rabbits, chipmunks, skunks, raccoons foxes); birds (e.g. thrashers, cardinals, sparrows bobwhite quail); reptiles and amphibians (e.g. fence lizards, box turtles and gray treefrogs) and a host of insects and other invertebrates. https://dof.virginia.gov/wp-content/uploads/Brush-Piles-for-Wildlife_pub.pdf Of course the brush pile should be on your property and not include any invasive species. Interesting side note: Fairfax County uses the same argument - "piles of yard waste attract rodents and snakes" - but rather vilifies these creatures to support their warning about encroaching on Fairfax County Park land. <https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/parks/encroachment>

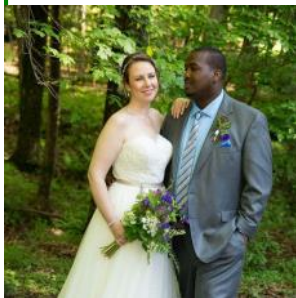
LANDSCAPING

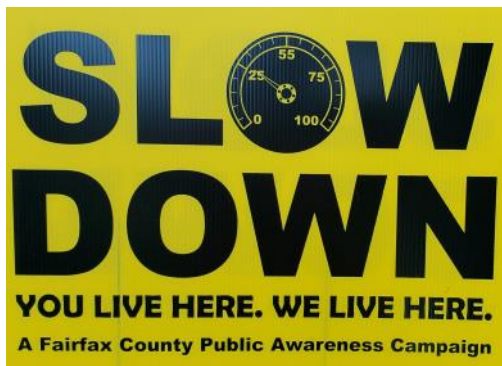
Also, people still do not know how to walk on the proper side of the road & it is actually dangerous. They walk on the side with cars coming behind them, with children in strollers & ear buds in.

Plant this, not that

Some planting suggestions from Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District.



Plant This, Not That

Buttonbush

(*Cephalanthus occidentalis*)



Buttonbush is a flowering plant that is native to the eastern and southern US including Fairfax County. It blooms in mid-summer and its round flowers attract pollinators including bees and butterflies.

Butterfly Bush

(*Buddleia davidii*)



Butterfly bush is a non-native shrub that produces large clusters of flowers that bloom in mid-summer. The bush also produces a large number of seeds that can spread into the surrounding environment making it a threat to native species.

Plant This, Not That

GREEN AND GOLD

(*Chrysogonum virginianum*)



Green and gold is a native low-growing plant that can provide attractive ground cover. This plant blooms with yellow flowers in spring to summer and is a pollinator friendly plant.

ENGLISH IVY

(*Hedera helix*)



English ivy is a non-native plant that has been described as invasive in Virginia. The plant grows as a vine and is capable of covering and killing trees and choking out other ground plants, creating a desert of ivy.

Plant This, Not That

Muhly Grass

(*Muhlenbergia capillaris*)



Muhly Grass is a native perennial plant that blooms in the late summer to fall. It's bloom color ranges from pink to purple. This plant is low maintenance and resistant to insects and diseases. In the fall, this grass produces seeds that can attract local hungry birds.

Fountain Grass

(*Pennisetum alopecuroides*)



Fountain grass is a non-native perennial plant that blooms in the late summer to fall. It's bloom color ranges from tan to reddish purple. This grass tends to grow in clusters and can spread into natural areas.

Plant This, Not That

Red Chokeberry

(*Aronia arbutifolia*)



Red chokeberry is a deciduous shrub that is native to Fairfax County. It blooms with white flowers in the spring and in the fall the leaves turn a bright red. The berries can attract mammals and birds while the flowers attract pollinators including bees and butterflies.

Burning Bush

(*Euonymus alatus*)



Burning bush is a deciduous shrub and has been identified as invasive in Virginia. Burning bush also produces berries that birds and mammals may eat and disperse elsewhere. The shrub can outcompete some native plants and begin spreading rapidly and take over natural areas.

Need service hours?



Please keep your donations coming. We need plenty of gently used books, audio books, CDs, and DVDS for our next sale.



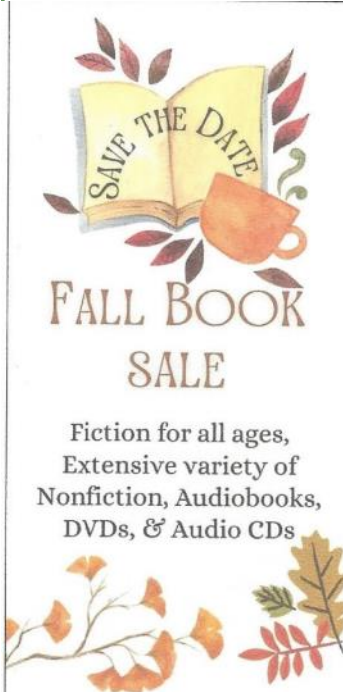

COMMENTS AND INPUT FROM OUR RESIDENTS

SUMMER RUMINATIONS ON THE SEASON SO FAR:

1. Pruning fruit trees correctly:

- a. Fruit trees need smart pruning. The reason I list “correctly” here is that I planned to bag by plum tree (to prevent pests) but when the time came, the branches were much longer than my nylon bags. I have since cut the tree right back, and plan to keep it more compact – with the branches being as long as my bags only!



2. Applying pest control timely:

- a. Still on the topic of my plum, I have missed putting the hormone trap up to get rid of the codling moths timely this year, and tried neem oil last year and was lax in putting up my net bags thinking the plums were too small for the moths to lay eggs in. I still got a handful of plums – even with the raccoons and squirrels gnawing through one of the bags but will know, that next year – as soon as the plums flowers drop, to pop the bags on!

3. Starting seeds indoors:

- a. I have shared in the past my efforts to start seeds indoors, with “efforts” emphasized because I realized this year, you need the right equipment. UV lights come with 100 different qualities and plants need more than just the UV part. I have seen how my transplanted seeds take 2 months to get going, while seeds planted at the same time outside are “off to the races” in no time at all! Some seeds work well, and some do not and then timing is everything – i.e., getting them into the ground at the right time, especially with the late frosts

4. Record keeping:

- a. Each season I look forward to trying new seed varieties but when these fail, I forget about them and try again the next year – often with seed with a poor germination rate
- b. Also curbing my enthusiasm for things that do not fit in my garden is hard to do.
- c. And a tomato is a tomato is a tomato. 30 different types still taste (almost) the same in a caprese salad – reading a catalog simply convinces you, you need something else. Not the case!

5. Tree protection:

- a. Young trees need to be protected – from male deer using them as antler scrapes, to squirrels stripping the bark or weed whackers doing the same thing (an inch from the bottom). to landscapers dropping things on them. I use some plastic spirals and base guards. The trick here, however, is to know when to apply them and when to take them off!

6. Over-seeding my beds:

- a. Every year I buy a packet of seed and think about planting just what we need, but when the time comes, I get far too excited and lose the plot by overseeding an area. This year I tried radishes, and while these started well soon became jungle-esque and I did not get a single root because as they competed for light – grew tall and did not put energy into the root.
- b. In some cases, over seeding means putting all my seed out just in time for the slug onslaught and I do not get a single leaf, just ask my “miner’s lettuce”. This means I do not have seed to use for a second sowing.

7. Research:

- a. Maypops and Jerusalem artichokes, while natives to N. America, are incredibly invasive and need to be fully contained. They look great, but unless you manage these plants, they are going to spring up everywhere!
- b. Companion planting

8. Smarter planting for seasonal interest:

- a. I have tried to plan my flower beds, and often think I’ll divide and re-plant, but totally forget about the seasons. What invariably happens is my plants go in, look great then when their time is up, there is nothing to help fill that gap. Also, many of the plants spread and completely take over – my rudbeckia has completely taken over where my salvia grew because it “leafs” out earlier in the year and then competes for space. I’d like to think I get an A for the ideas but a C- for the execution.
- b. Planting at all! I have a bunch of seeds that I thought I’d plant but was on the fence because of the weather, location, right time to do it and so on and just never got round to it. Now I must hope they are stored well enough to be planted next year!

9. Staying on top of weeds and other badies:

- a. I should mulch more, but since I do not know where my plants are in their dormant stage I do not (see above) ... This means I need to pull my weeds and if its not done daily then it becomes unmanageable. Included here are the invasives – pachysandra, and the one fish mint. I hate them and try and dispatch them both by spraying on a chemical then dumping grass cuttings on top to kill it. Limited success so far...



- b. One thing I must get ahead of next year is the black rot on my grapes – a clean base, good disposal process just isn’t working... I may need to spray to kill the spores that rot the grapes on the vine...

10. Not thinking about the wildlife:

- a. Fireflies love long grass! I only recently read that, so while I've mowed around the clover patches (forage for my bees, nitrogen for the soil, and mow-able mulch for the grass) I decided to let my lawn go for a while... no-mow May, June, July and the fireflies were the best I've seen! Basically, a silent version of July 4th fireworks! However, back from vacation I mowed and could not tell you the variety of snakes (Dekays Brown, Ring Necked, Garter) and the thousands of crickets, grasshoppers, moths butterflies all now making a living in my pasture. I felt sad regaining my lawn from the savannah it had become.



- b. Hungry critters... Every year racoons pillage my grapes – which is fine because the grapes are sour, but the mess they leave is a pain. Some years I cut the grapes off and toss them, and others I keep 'em. Deer, I have heard do not like tight spaces – but when I saw a video of a deer on someone's enclosed porch, I know my open veggie garden was up for grabs – and true to form the deer mowed down my peppers, beans, strawberries, spinach, and even the easy to reach Asian pear leaves. One must always remember the chipmunks which have ravaged my strawberry harvest, my Asian pears among other things. For them I bought a slingshot but have yet to land a shot. And slugs – this year I am going to sacrifice a few beers in a can to thin the slug population.



- c. And forgive the beneficial insects! The leaf cutter bees enjoyed cutting half circles out of my Saskatoon Serviceberry leaves, but the shrub is still okay! No harm, no foul.

11. Composting:

- a. All my veggie cuttings and fruit that did not “make it” goes into my home made wormeries and this goes into my veggie beds, barrels, etc. as a fertilizer. But all the other cuttings from my garden go into my compost bin and I do not do anything with it. I really should find a use for all that good compost, so it does not go to waste!

12. Use it or lose it!

- a. Use as much as you can in your garden, or it will go to waste. This year we made clover jelly (delicious in cocktails, elderflower cordial, endless salads (hops are great in salad), caprese salads, honey on toast!). But, I've lost out on a bunch of squashes, fresh herbs (before they go to flower), corn, beans – among other things because we weren't home to enjoy it all.

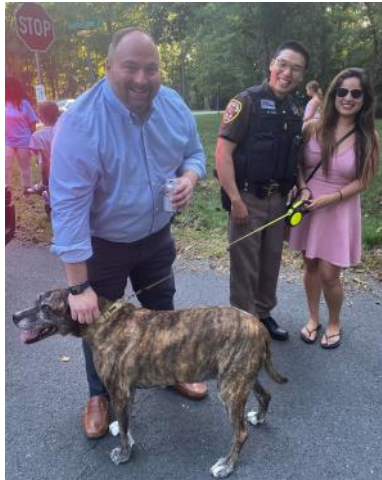

In the last issue of the newsletter we introduced a neighbor, Barbara Roberts, who has written and published two books for middle grade children (ages 8-13). The timing of the article matched the release of her second book *A Rose Named Peace: How Francis Meilland Created a Flower of Hope for a World at War*. The book has a compelling story, beautiful illustrations and a timely message for those seeking a sense of peace and hope for the future. Barbara's first book has an equally strong message, with an amazing back story. The book is *Nikki on the Line*, and it is about a 13 year old girl who dreams of playing basketball, while also dealing with multiple issues at home and school. Barbara has a very informative website, barbaracarrollroberts.com, that gives



the story of how she was inspired by her mother-in-law and her own and her daughter's interest in basketball. The following is taken from her website. This material was written for a young audience, and it illustrates how writing in a simple, conversational style, Barbara can skillfully tell an important story.

“Why I Wrote *Nikki on the Line* — or a Short History of Girls’ High School Basketball (in One Family)

In 1940, my mother-in-law, Betty Helen McLemore Roberts, was lucky enough to attend a high school that offered girls the opportunity to play competitive sports. Here she is with her basketball team at J.J. Kelly High School in Wise, Virginia (Betty Helen is just to the right of the girl holding the trophy).

I love their cool, shiny uniforms.



Here's what wasn't cool (or lucky), though. When Betty Helen played basketball, the people in charge of girls' sports thought that "vigorous" exercise was "unladylike" and harmful for girls. So, unlike the boys' teams that played with five players on the floor, all of whom ran up and down the length of the court, dribbling, passing, shooting, playing both offense and defense, the girls' teams played what was called "a half-court game." Six players from each team on the court. Three in the frontcourt on offense. Three in the backcourt on defense. *No player could cross the halfcourt line.* Also, the girls *could not run* while dribbling the ball

(too vigorous). If they caught a pass, they could only dribble once before passing the ball to another girl.

Wow. That doesn't sound much like basketball, does it?

But still, Betty Helen got to play on a team. Competing against other schools. Working together with her teammates.

Having fun.

I had fun playing basketball, too. Especially because by the time I started high school in 1970, some things had changed. The people in charge of girls' sports had finally decided that vigorous exercise was okay for girls. (What a surprise!) So now we could play full-court, dribbling-the-ball, running-the-length-of-the-floor, everyone-plays-both-offense-and-defense basketball. Just like the boys.

And like my mother-in-law, I was lucky! Because unlike many school districts across the country, my school district in California offered competitive sports for girls. Girls' teams — just like boys' teams — could play against teams from other schools in our district. Our sports weren't confined to our P.E. classes.

But here's what wasn't lucky.

Here I am with my Monta Vista High School teammates in 1971 (I'm #11 and my sister is #12). Do you see what we're wearing?

Gym suits and tie-on pinnies with numbers, while the boys' teams wore real basketball uniforms supplied by the school. And do you see where we're sitting? Outside on the blacktop courts. We were only allowed to play in the gym when the boys weren't using it. Also, unlike the boys, we played only our regular-season district games. No district play-offs. No regional tournaments. State championship games? Not a chance.

But still, we were playing. Competing. And we were a team. (I still know the names of every girl in this picture, even though, besides my sister, I haven't spoken with any of them in many years).

And then ... something big happened.

Something Really Big.

In 1972, the U.S. Congress passed a law called Title IX. And Title IX said that any school or college or university that received funds from the federal government (which was pretty much all of them), had to provide girls and women with the same opportunities they gave to boys and men.

In every academic field.

And in competitive sports.

My friends and I didn't see many immediate changes after Title IX was passed, but by the time my daughter was in high school in the 2010s, her basketball teams — by law — had the same funding and gym-access and school support as the boys' teams.

And it wasn't because they were lucky.

It was because they *deserved* it.

Because our laws had finally caught up to what was fair.

And here's my daughter, about to hit a 3-pointer in a state tournament game.

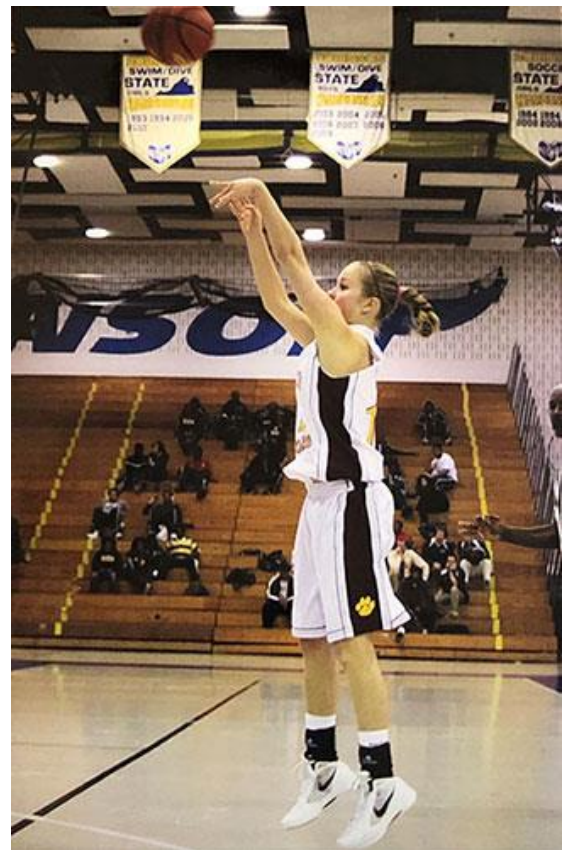
But even after all these changes to girls' athletics, when my daughter was in middle school and high school, there still weren't many books about girls who loved playing sports.

That's why I wrote *Nikki on the Line*.

For all the sports-loving girls like my daughter.

And for the girls my mother-in-law and I had once been."

Barbara told me she felt frustrated when her daughter got to middle school because she lost interest in reading for pleasure. Unlike her brother who had shelves and shelves of books about boys who played sports, she found very few books about girls who played sports. What a wonderful way to go about addressing the problem. If you would like to read Barbara's books or gift them to appropriate readers, the Fairfax County Library system carries them, and they are usually in stock at Bards Alley on Church Street in Vienna. I hope for more books to come from this thoughtful author.
